Facts About Our Proposed Church Building

1. Nave will seat 295 worshippers.
2. Chancel will be in accord with our Reformed tradition of pulpit and lectern and free standing communion table and baptismal font.
3. Pastor's study, main church office and waiting room will be directly behind the Chancel area - with the Pastor's study accessible directly to the Chancel.
4. Loft above the narthex will be arranged for a Choir of 50 members. The organ console and the organ will be arranged by the Moeller Organ Company, the original builders of our pipe organ.
5. Combination narthex-foyer will allow a "conversation" area and a lounge area between the Sanctuary and the Christian Education Building.
6. Adequate coat storage will be in the Christian Education Building and the Narthex.
7. Christian Education unit will feature 2 floor areas:
 - a. First floor area has 10 Classrooms, with special rest-room facilities adjacent to the Nursery, 1st and 2nd year rooms.
 - b. Second floor (basement area) houses 7 Classrooms, choir room, rest-rooms, storage and kitchenette and area for small fellowship dinners and programs.
8. Boiler room with forced hot water heat, and necessary mechanical heating devices.
9. Adequate parking space on 3 sides of the building. Easy access to any part of the Church Building especially in inclement weather.
10. Estimated cost of Unit I, the Sanctuary and Unit II, the Christian Education Building \$ 165,000.

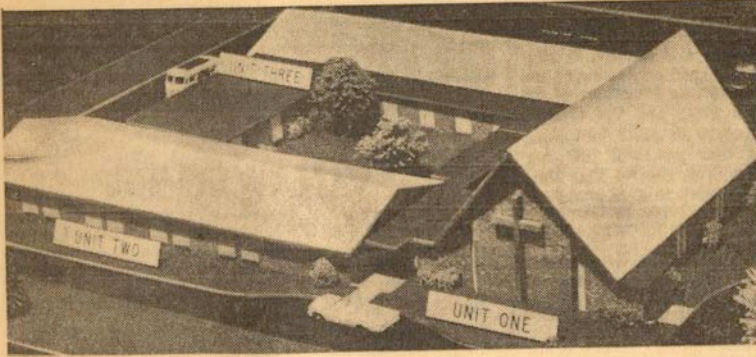
FUTURE PLANS FOR THE FAIRGREEN UNITED PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

1. In 3 years Unit III of the Master Plan will be started and consist of a complete Fellowship Hall (seating 275) and connecting units, with additional kitchen facilities.

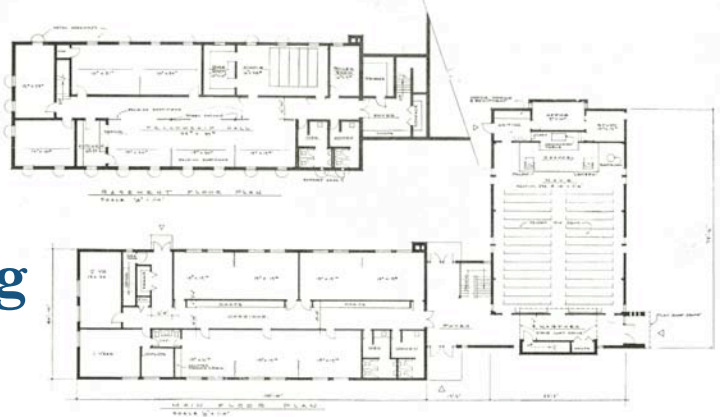

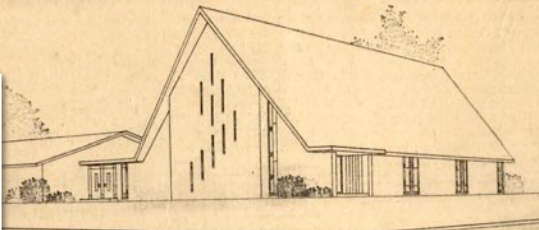

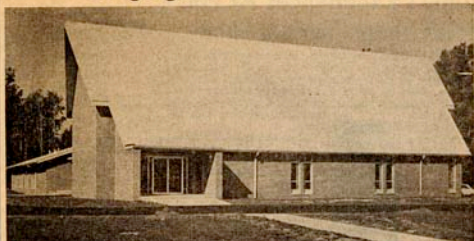

Dedication planned for church developed from Rosewood Avenue Church

Fairgreen Church Dedication Slated

\$200,000 Project Developed By 500

Dedication of the Fairgreen United Presbyterian Church is scheduled tomorrow at 3:30 p.m.

Guest speaker will be Dr. Richard Moore, associate executive of the Synod of Ohio, United Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.

The Fairgreen congregation of 500 developed from a "colonization" project of Rosewood Avenue Presbyterian Church, the Presbytery of Maumee, and the denomination's board of national missions.

The organizing pastor is the Rev. Thomas Prosser, formerly of Rosewood Church. Services have been in Hiawatha School the last two years.

The building occupies a two-acre site on Fairgreen Avenue at Laskey Road and was constructed at a cost of \$200,000, including parking lots, equipment, and landscaping. The Floyd Bacher Co. was general contractor.

The sanctuary seats 265 persons, and the education unit provides 17 classrooms, narthex, shade room, kitchenette, and fellowship areas on two floors.

Open house will follow the dedication service with tea to be served by the Women's As-

sociation headed by Mrs. Lloyd

Windsor. Participants in the service will include Dr. John Miller Gold, the general presbyter of this area; Myrle Foster; Jacob Close, an elder; and Mr. Prosser who also will preach in the 11 a.m. service.

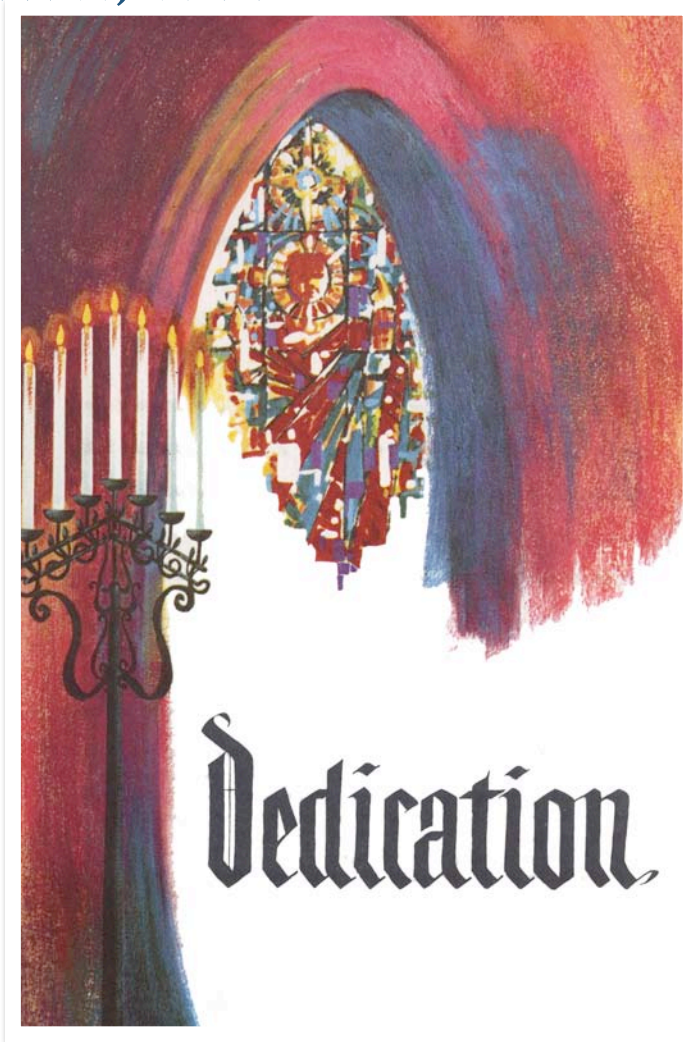

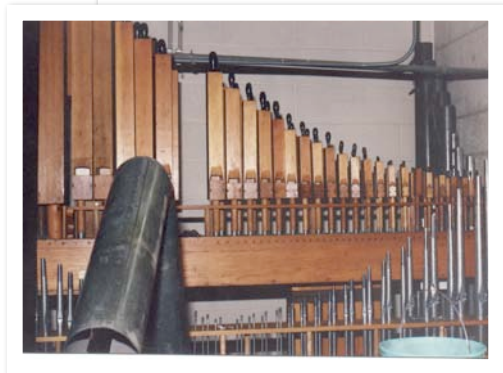

Organ Constructed in 1923.

THE PIPE ORGAN PRESENTLY LOCATED IN THE LOFT OF THE FAIRGREEN CHURCH WAS DESIGNED AND CONSTRUCTED BY THE M. P. MOELLER COMPANY OF HAGERSTOWN, MD., IN 1923. THE ORGAN WAS PRESENTED TO THE ROSEWOOD AVENUE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH BY THE WOMEN'S PHILATHEA BIBLE CLASS IN 1924.

THE PIPE ORGAN WAS MOVED TO THE FAIRGREEN CHURCH BUILDING IN JANUARY OF THIS YEAR. IT HAS BEEN TONALLY REVISED AND COMPLETELY RENOVATED AND INSTALLED BY THE TOLEDO PIPE ORGAN COMPANY UNDER THE VERY ABLE DIRECTION OF MR. JULIAN BULLEY.

THIS MOELLER ORGAN CONTAINS OVER 1,000 PIPES OF WOOD AND METAL. IT IS A 9 RANK INSTRUMENT. A NEW SPENCER ORGAN BLOWER HAS BEEN INSTALLED BENEATH THE LOFT IN THE NARTHEX OF THE BUILDING TO SUPPLY THE AIR NEEDED FOR THE GREAT AND SWELL CHESTS OF THE ORGAN.

THE 2 MANUAL CONSOLE WAS COMPLETELY REWIRED IN THE PROCESS OF THE INSTALLATION IN OUR NEW BUILDING. THE STOPS THAT ARE CONTAINED ARE:

DR. JAMES J. HAMMANN, a native of Sidney, Ohio, holds a Bachelor of Music degree in organ performance from Ohio Wesleyan University and a Master of Music degree from the University of Michigan. He has appeared in recitals throughout the United States, and during the summer of 1987, was the soloist with the Lawton Philharmonic Chamber Orchestra on a tour of Germany. He has given over 75 performances in a man show, "Old Bach," a presentation where he donned a wig, plays the organ and harpsichord, and recreates the life of the composer's life.

DR. HAMMANN has appeared in concert at the Fairgreen United Presbyterian Church in New York City. He holds the Organ Diploma from the American Guild of Organists and he serves as the national vice president of the Organ Historical Society.

DR. HAMMANN served as director of music at First Baptist Church, Toledo, the First Methodist Church, Toledo, Greenfield Congregational Church, Dearborn, MI, North Methodist Church, Columbus, OH, and is currently the organist for the St. Charles Baptist Church in New Orleans and Adjunct Professor of Music at the University of New Orleans.



Planning New Addition

Where, What, When, Why and How about the New Addition

Building at Fairgreen - 1985

1. Why are we planning the addition at this time?
The needs exist the economy is favorable for loans' the construction costs are reasonable and the congregation is willing. The plans are not new, but the time is right.
2. When is the construction planned to begin?
Late Spring 1986. Completion by Nov. 1986
3. Will this addition change the parking capacity?
No, the unit will be placed in the lawn area of the church property.
4. How many will fit in the multi purpose room?
The capacity is 250 people for a meal.
5. Are more additions planned for another time?
NO, this is the final proposed unit. Plans for such a unit were included in the original plans for Fairgreen in 1965.
6. How much will it cost?
\$452,000 including financing.
7. How will it be financed?
Repayment is planned for 9 years or less. There will be a maximum of 3 – 3 year pledge periods. The goal of the first 3 year period is \$175 000.
8. How much of the Kemper Fund will be used?
\$30,000 will be given. If we all give generously, this will help lower the 9 year repayment period.
9. What are the members of Fairgreen United Presbyterian Church being invited to pledge in this campaign?

The Building Fund Committee and the Session are recommending a three year pledge goal of 4 1/2% of family annual income, in addition to maintaining the regular financial stewardship pledge.

10. The Campaign Director met with members of the Session, the Building Fund Committee, and other interested members of the congregation. After working through estimates of average family income and the requirements for new addition, the group concluded



that 4 1/2% would be a realistic goal that would allow us to move ahead with our plans.

11. What is the cost of this campaign?

The General Assembly receives a fee of \$7.00 per church member for the services of the Church Financial Campaign Service, which provides the campaign Director. The local church also pays the Director's travel and residence expenses as well as our local campaign costs. Typically' the total campaign cost runs 3 to 5% of the funds raised by the campaign.



12. Where does the campaign money come from?

From the existing building fund.

13. How much is in the present building fund?

\$60,813.50 as of December 31, 1985.

14. What is the overall financial position of Fairgreen?

It is in sound financial standing.

The proposed construction is well within the current potential of this congregation.

15. Can we afford the increased utility and custodial expenses?

We believe we can sustain these increases. They are part of the 1986 budget.

16. What will the operating budget be for 1986?

\$101,513 - which is only a 1.03% increase over 1985.

17. How should each family determine its pledge gift?

This is entirely an individual decision. We invite you to read, listen, pray and carefully consider all the information presented, then we invite you to Pledge as best you can to the building and to the current operating fund.

18. What happens if we don't raise enough?

We think we can reach our goal. Any other outcome would require rethinking and revoting on our plans.

19. When do we start paying pledges?

March 1, 1986 for the building fund.

30TH BIRTHDAY PARTY & HOMECOMING (*Reprinted*) 13 OCTOBER 1996

The roots of Fairgreen were planted and nurtured in the faith and spirit of the Rosewood Avenue Presbyterian Church. The Rosewood Church was organized on October 1, 1889 and was located in the area of Bancroft and Monroe Street. There were 40 people who signed the initial petition to form the church which was known as the Fifth Presbyterian Church. In 1907 it was decided to sell the church property and relocate the church across the street on property purchased from Edmund D. Libby.

In the new location, a stone Sunday School and chapel were built, and the church was renamed the Rosewood Avenue Presbyterian Church. An interesting note, at that time the church had 230 members and had 175 people in attendance at Sunday School. On September 15, 1924 the corner stone was laid for the addition of the Sanctuary and the basement gymnasium. With this addition, the church structure was completed.

In its life, Rosewood was an active church and contributed numerous missionaries who served the Church throughout the world. There were times when the Rosewood Church experienced difficulties. It suffered, as did others, through the great depression and the effects and emotional drain of World War II. In spite of adversity, it stayed strong and survived.

A major change in the life of Rosewood came during the 1960's, when the neighborhood of the church, the area of Bancroft and Monroe Streets, which was an integrating neighborhood, also became a neighborhood with a high crime rate. The later was a serious problem as the church did not have a parking lot. Consequently, all parking was on-street. For safety reasons, this necessitated the curtailing of evening activities at the church.

At that time, it became apparent to the pastor and the session that if the church was to survive in this location, it would have to become a truly integrated church.

When our pastor, Reverend Jay Bishop, left us to serve in another church, the criteria for our next pastor was that he or she must be a person who understood the nature of an integrated neighborhood. In the person of the Reverend Thomas Prosser, we felt as if we had found the pastor who was qualified to take the church through the steps of integration. Although Reverend Prosser's church was not integrated, it was situated in an integrated neighborhood, and he had excellent relations and understanding with his neighboring churches. Reverend Prosser was called on March 5, 1961 to lead Rosewood through a period of transition.

With the arrival of Tom Prosser at Rosewood, a conscientious and serious effort was made to integrate the Rosewood Church and to serve all people in the neighborhood. Unfortunately, the efforts to integrate the church met with insurmountable problems, not the least of which was a lack of cooperation from other churches and minority organizations in the neighborhood. It is not necessary to dwell on this subject as it is now moot, and to fully explain it would take a lengthy message of its own.

When it became apparent that Rosewood could not survive at its location, the Pastor and the session considered the means of salvaging the congregation as a Presbyterian congregation. The obvious best solution was to relocate the church.

When this solution was taken to Presbytery for concurrence, Presbytery refused to sanction the move. The attitude of Presbytery was that Rosewood must remain at Bancroft and Monroe Street. This attitude persisted in spite of all the information presented as to the inability of the church to continue to survive in the neighborhood.

The session of Rosewood felt that it could not assure survival of the church, and offered to turn the church property over to Presbytery for its continuing use as a church. The Presbytery declined to accept this offer.

Reverend Prosser worked diligently to resolve the stalemate. After many months of consultation and negotiation he was able to work out a compromise with Presbytery.

The Rosewood Church would establish a mission church in an agreed upon location. Upon successful establishment of the mission church, the members of the Rosewood congregation could transfer their letters to the mission church.

The mission church was started in the Hiawatha School. Concurrently, the Rosewood congregation furnished the seed money for the land and building for a new church. It also established a building committee and employed an architect. The location of the land inspired the name for the new church, The Fairgreen Presbyterian Church.

When the new building was completed and the mission church was firmly established, the congregation of Rosewood transferred its letters and joined with the Fairgreen Church.

There are some significant facts relating to the founding of Fairgreen:

The Fairgreen Church was not a satellite of Rosewood Church. It was an independent mission church.

The members of the Rosewood Church joined Fairgreen, not vice-versa.

The Rosewood congregation contributed the means of bringing life to Fairgreen.

As the members of Rosewood joined with Fairgreen, they contributed essential leadership in the forming stages, including: the pastor, elders, deacons, and church staff.

They also contributed a traditional, friendly and concerned basis of church operation, and a large number of willing workers - dedicated to helping Fairgreen grow.

As a side note, the Rosewood building still stands in all its glory. It now has a large adjacent parking lot provided by urban renewal. However, removal of the then existing buildings and the gift of the land was not an option available to Rosewood thirty years ago.

You might consider the founding of Fairgreen as being similar to a family in which the parents give life to a child. And as in a family, the parents guide the child in growth, fully expecting the day to arrive when the child is independent. This child, Fairgreen Church, is now thirty years old and has long ago become a mature and self-sufficient entity. This does not eliminate a relationship, it merely accepts what is normal in the growth pattern.

As the founders of the Fairgreen Church, the former members of Rosewood take great pride in their achievement in successfully establishing a mission church, and in the growth and success of the church that belongs to all of us, the Fairgreen Presbyterian Church.
