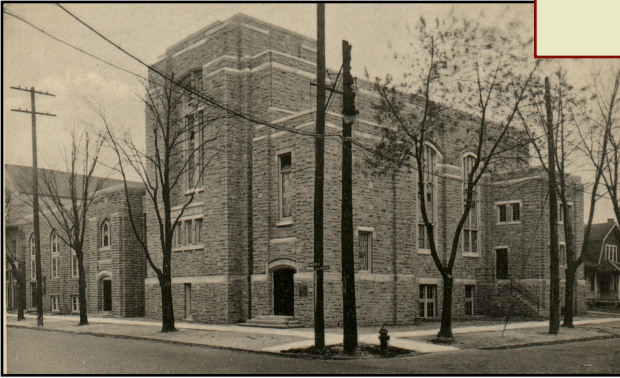
## Rosewood Avenue Presbyterian Church

*Beginning of "Rosewood Chapel" - A Brief History.*

The history of the Rosewood Avenue Presbyterian Church, with its spacious and beautiful new auditorium, its complete facilities for spiritual, social and recreational community service, dates back to the organization of the Fifth Presbyterian Church.



In the spring of 1889 forty persons signed a petition for the organization of a Presbyterian Church in the vicinity of the present church edifice. Pastors of the First, Third and Westminster churches were among those who attended a preliminary meeting in the old Fountain Hall July 21 that year. Three weeks later a Sunday School was organized in Baumgardner's Hall. George Doolittle, who later became a missionary in Syria, was its first superintendent. . .

The church, with a small and struggling membership, was organized formally October 1, 1889. The Rev. J. W. Cummings supplied the pulpit until the following January when the first regular pastor, the Rev. S. D. Conger, was called.

The members built their first church, a small frame structure, on a triangular lot at Bancroft and Monroe Streets and dedicated it December 6, 1890. The membership increased until this building became inadequate and it was decided by the congregation in 1907 to sell the property and erect as the first unit of a new church a stone Sunday School and Chapel building at the rear of the lot purchased of Edmund D. Libbey and now occupied by the complete new church, at Rosewood Avenue and Bancroft Street. Membership at that time was about 230, with an average Sunday School attendance of 175, despite the fact that after the sale of the old building the congregation was temporarily without a home of its own and services were held in a Baptist Chapel in Auburndale.

It was during the pastorate of the Rev. Lemuel R. Hogan that the church moved into the first unit of the present building. The cornerstone was laid September 15, 1907, and it was dedicated May 10, 1908. The dedicatory sermon was preached by the Rev. Ira Landrith.

It was soon after this that the Rev. D. H. Johnston was called to the pastorate. During Dr. Johnston's pastorate the membership increased rapidly and first tentative plans were made for a new auditorium. First subscriptions of money also were made for that purpose but building operations were deferred on account of the outbreak of the World War, a scarcity of labor and advance in the cost of building material. Dr. Johnston was a sincere and hard worker for the

Lord. He thought the people, not only of his church but of the city, needed a great spiritual awakening and through his prayers and efforts brought Billy Sunday here. He left the church in 1918 after nine years of Christian service.

The Rev. Ralph A. Garrison came in 1919 and remained until 1922. The Rev. Clair B. Gahagen came in November, 1922. Through his consecrated efforts and devotion, the church sanctuary was built. The dedication service was held on Sunday, November 30, 1924. The sanctuary, though marked by simplicity, impresses the worshiper with a sense of reverence. The gymnasium has afforded many hours of fun and fellowship, especially for the children and youth.

The Rev. Charles Clark McKinney, DD., became pastor in 1928 and served until January 31, 1939. At that time the depression hit us, but through his magnificent work and prayer and the splendid efforts of consecrated members, we were able to pull through, though at times we were in grave danger of losing the building.

Charles T. Martz won the hearts of the people and was instrumental in liquidating a \$12,000 mortgage and in building up the church in membership and interest. He remained till February 12, 1944. On July 23, 1944, our pastor, The Rev. J. Kenneth Cutler, was installed.
